## MENTOR INFORMATION FOR ROCKLAND P.L.U.S. Planning Land Use with Students

March, 2016

Dear Rockland PLUS Mentor:

Thank you for joining us to be a mentor for the 2016 Rockland Planning Land Use with Students (PLUS) project. The planning team, teachers and students value your input and the time you spend with them during the project's culminating symposium at **SUNY Rockland Community College** on **Friday, March 18, 2016**.

Rockland P.L.U.S. 2016 focuses on planning for sustainable communities through transit focused planning. Our 2016 event combines the best elements of previous years' programming. In the classroom workshops leading up to the symposium, students explored: (1) their connection to community, (2) the perspectives and needs of community members at different stages of life, (3) the strengths and weaknesses of the wider community and (4) what role different types of transportation play in a community. They then assessed their local transit station and the surrounding area, and re-envision the space to create a community hub, integrating features that promote a community balance of Social Connections, Economic Opportunity and Environmental Sensitivity (S.E.E.) – They are able to S.E.E. their community in a whole new way.

At the symposium, students from the participating high schools will first present their vision for creating a 'community hub' through revitalizing their local transit hub (bus or train) to create an sense of place around the transit stop. They will then gather input from you to improve their plan. They have focused on this specific space and how it can support and improve the wider community through innovation and partnerships. Following these presentations, the students will work in mixed school teams, applying what they've learned to a larger project; the development of a proposal for Exit 10 on the thruway in Nyack as part of the NYS New Bridge project. Their designs will focus on reconnecting the village a bringing in new commercial ventures.

This year at the symposium we have 7 participating high schools groups: Clarkstown North, Nanuet, Nyack, Pearl River, P-Tech and Spring Valley and Suffern.
